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Avoid unnecessary burning

During the COVID-19 crisis, local fire departments and first responders are doing everything they can to protect their own health so that they are ready to protect others. Many people are also extremely concerned about their respiratory health.

So before starting an outdoor burn of any type, please consider the potential impacts on your neighbors and on local emergency responders, and postpone or cancel your burn if possible.

Also, avoid causing excessive smoke from wood-burning stoves used for home heating. The <u>Northwest Clean Air Agency</u> has received a number of complaints about heavy woodstove smoke.
