Local counties lift fire safety burn bans Wednesday, 10/26

Fire officials in Whatcom, Skagit, and Island counties have lifted their fire safety burn bans effective Wednesday, Oct. 26.

The burn bans on outdoor residential and land-clearing fires began in July.

During periods of high fire danger and hot, dry conditions, county fire officials can call for bans on residential and land-clearing burning in unincorporated areas.

The <u>Northwest Clean Air Agency</u> does not issue fire safety burn bans. The agency can call air quality burn bans depending on the amount of smoke pollution in the air, such as when winds carry wildfire smoke into NWCAA's jurisdiction (Island, Skagit, and Whatcom counties).
